3. UPDATE ON ROYAL ROADS WATER RESOURCES PROJECT

The project agreement between OPSRRA and student-formed group from Royal Roads University Environmental Sciences program has been approved and finalized. The group consists of four students and is named *Pacific Priority Solutions*. The agreement also included the budget and time frame.

Two OPSRRA Directors, Marika Nagasaka (President), Brenda Mark (Treasurer) and OPSRRA member Gerard LeBlanc met with Regional Director Mike Hicks and Planning Supervisor Iain Lawrence to present the project and request consideration of a CRD Grant-In-Aid to assist with the expenses. Application has been made for a grant, and OPSRRA will provide \$200.00 towards the expenses as well (motion made at the January 2016 OPSRRA Directors Meeting).

Two members of the OPSRRA subcommittee (formed for the project), Brenda Mark and Sandy Barta attended the March 18th presentation of the project by the student group at Royal Roads University. That Power Point presentation by the group can be viewed on the OPSRRA website under Community Issues, as can the Project Agreement which outlines all the details.

On March 29th, the students will be doing a site visit of Otter Point, Shirley and Jordan River to familiarize themselves with the area and meet Planner Iain Lawrence, who will be their contact person for the CRD regarding questions about GIS and other planning-related matters.

During the tour they will stop at various sites to see different water supply sources and methods of delivery. A number of OPSRRA members have volunteered to take part and provide on-site information to the student group about their particular water source.

4. OPSRRA AGM SET FOR APRIL 17TH

The OPSRRA Annual General Meeting will be held on Sunday, April 17th, 2016 at 2:00 p.m. at the JDF Local Area Services Building. Regional Director Mike Hicks sends his regrets as he will be out of town that weekend and unable to attend. An agenda will be sent to members by e-mail.

Our association membership annually elects three members to be their executive and four to be their directors. The following slate of candidates is being put forward by the Nominations Committee for the coming elections (all incumbents): Marika Nagasaka, Sandy Barta, Brenda Mark, Fiona McDannold, Debb Read and Bill Dushenko and we are still working on finalizing the 7th name of a member willing to stand for election.

5. INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR 2016 PROPERTY TAXES

Property owners in the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area (JDFEA) received their 2015 property assessment from the B.C. Assessment Authority in January, 2016. These valuations are used by the various taxing authorities to determine individual property taxes that will be due July 1st, 2016. Because the JDFEA is unincorporated the province collects property taxes from us on behalf of the province, the Electoral Area, the Capital Regional District (CRD) and Sooke School District #62. The province and the CRD determine their portions of the property tax using a separate process which is beyond the direct control of the JDFEA Regional Director. The budget for SD #62 is prepared by our elected School Trustees and the District's staff but is ultimately determined by the province.

The JDFEA regional director has the responsibility to work with CRD Financial Services to oversee the budget for taxable items directly attributed to the JDFEA. This portion of the budget is then reviewed by the Electoral Area Services Committee of the CRD Board of Directors before being approved by the full CRD Board. The 2016 JDFEA budget was approved by the CRD Board of Directors on March 30th.

Director Hicks shared the draft budget report with OPSRRA so we could prepare this story in time for the April newsletter.

In 2011, OPSRRA encouraged Director Hicks to post budget information to the JDFEA web site. OPSRRA helped to draft the detailed explanation of the JDFEA budget process which is available at: <https://www.crd.bc.ca/about/about-the-region/juan-de-fuca/property-tax-budget-information-for-the-juan-de-fuca-electoral-area>

Director Hicks now prepares an annual tax report for the JDFEA showing what services you are taxed for and at what rate per \$100,000 of assessed property value. The following is an excerpt from the draft 2016 Tax Report showing some of the more expensive items on your tax bill.

The films are focused on our relationship to food, both from a global perspective and from community initiatives that make food production, from field to plate, a local endeavor. 8. SPRING INTO BEAR AWARENESS

Spring is here and so are the bears! We have already been seeing bear conflicts. Bears going after chickens and bears in garbage.

It is time to start preparing for black bears seeking food sources in our neighbourhoods. Be proactive, minimize human-bear conflict and prevent bears from lingering in our residential neighbourhoods. You can help keep bears away from your home by removing any bear-attracting food sources.

If you live in Otter Point, Shirley and Jordan River, odds are you have bears living nearby. We live in bear country and should learn to expect to deal with bears. Preventing and/or reducing conflict with bears requires us to modify our behaviours

Is your residence area free of food odours that may attract a hungry bear?

It's time for spring clean up.

Bears season, typically begins in March-April and at this time they are lean and hungry. Bears eat the early shoots of skunk cabbage, grasses, horsetail, clover, and dandelions. They do not gain much weight on this diet and can continue to lose weight well into June and even into July. Bears will stay low in the valley bottoms during this time and will eventually go up to the hills in search of spring green-up and summer berries.

Let's keep them moving to the hills by not attracting them into our neighbourhoods with unnatural food sources.

Bears are attracted into our neighbourhoods by available unnatural food sources. We can reduce the potential for human-bear conflict by simply managing attractants. This means we ensure that wildlife can move through our community without being attracted.

We don't want to invite wildlife to stop and stay.

Bears are opportunistic omnivores and will return time and time again to a readily available food source; if the attractant is secured or removed, the bear will move on.

- Always store garbage indoors during bear season.
- Put your garbage tote on the curbside between the hours of 5 a.m. and 7 p.m. only on collection day and never the night before.
- Reduce odours by freezing the smelly stuff and dispose of the bag on collection day.
- Rinse out all recycling material to reduce odours.
- Set up an electric fencing system to protect chickens and livestock.
- Don't use birdfeeders during bear season.
- Ensure you have odourless compost by liming, turning frequently, cutting food into small pieces, layering greens (nitrogen) with browns (carbon) and never add meat, fish, fats, or oils.
- Consider digging a hole in the ground to bury your compost.
- Feed pets indoors and keep all bowls indoors.
- Keep barbeques clean and grease free by burning off an extra 5 minutes after removing food and remove or clean barbecue tools.
- Move fridges and freezers indoors or lock them.
- Talk to your neighbours about managing their attractants.

Wild Wise Sooke can provide you with educational intervention about reducing conflict with bears. They also will help you recognize the attractants and help you make changes that respect, enhance and conserve wildlife.
