3. OPSRAA NOV 20TH GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING REPORT

OPSRAA held a General Membership Meeting on November 20th at the JDF Local Area Services Building on the topic **“Water Resources Sustainability in Our Communities”**. Two BSc graduates of Royal Roads University Environmental Science program, Gayle Hatchard and Emily Rudderham were the guest speakers. Gayle and Emily were members of the Royal Roads student group, **Pacific Priority Solutions**, which was commissioned by OPSRAA to do a report on an **“Assessment of Water Resource Sustainability in Otter Point, Shirley and Jordan River”** as their Major Project for the 2015/16 term. This report can be viewed on the OPSRAA website or members can borrow a hard copy of the report by contacting any OPSRAA Director.

Regional Director Mike Hicks graciously attended the meeting, and his role in providing a Grant-In-Aid to fund the project was recognized and greatly appreciated by OPSRAA. A number of residents and OPSRAA members, who had a great deal of interest in the subject, were in attendance.

Gayle presented the ArcGIS database created for OPSRAA by the student group and demonstrated the database to the audience. Emily presented a summary of the 2016

Gayle and Emily responded to many questions and much discussion was generated. RD Mike Hicks also responded to questions addressed to him on the topic.

OPSRRA Director Sandy Barta spoke about iMapBC, the provincial mapping service that can be used to find data and information on water-related resources. She also spoke about QGIS, a free and easy to set up mapping program that can be customized with links to provincial, federal and other information. She offered to give inservices to anyone interested in learning how to use the programs.

OPSRRA Director Bill Dushenko talked about the Terms of Reference for a Royal Roads Major Project proposal for 2016/17. The title of the proposal is: **“Community Planning for Water Sustainability in Otter Point, Shirley and Jordan River”**. The project will build on key recommendations from the 2015/16 student group’s (**Pacific Priority Solutions**) Major Project final report. OPSRRA expects to hear soon if the proposal has been accepted.

4. CAMP BARNARD PAYS TRIBUTE TO HAL COULSON

The following was submitted to OPSRRA by the Camp Barnard Committee

Camp Barnard has always enjoyed the support of its neighbours in Otter Point. Donations of goods, services and cash often come our way. But the services of one local resident have been exceptional.

In the 12 years since the closing of the Scouts Canada office in Victoria, Otter Point resident and Scouting volunteer Hal Coulson has handled the bookings for every group that has used Camp Barnard- a year round job booking a very diverse collection of groups! Until October of this year, Hal handled all requests along with hundreds of questions from campers new to Camp Barnard. His responses were always prompt and to the point, his records meticulous, invoices and receipts sent on time, with weekly visits to the camp keeping him up to date on who was in the camp or to tour a new group around the facilities. Hal was truly a godsend to Camp Barnard! In October Hal told us that he was having trouble keeping up with this job due to failing health. On November 24th he passed away.

We are so indebted to Hal for his steadfast dedication to Camp Barnard. Our heartfelt sympathies got out to Carol, Laura, Warren and their families.

6. FILM AWARENESS “FOR THE LOVE OF MUSIC” EVENT

December's Awareness Film Night traditionally has been a benefit and this year is no exception. On December 14th, in collaboration with The Sooke Philharmonic Society and Harmony Project Sooke, we will be presenting "For the Love of Music", an evening of film, live music and refreshments to raise funds for both the SPO and HPS.

Founded in 1997 by conductor Norman Nelson, the Sooke Philharmonic Orchestra now has over 60 members and is recognized as *"one of Canada's finest community orchestras"*.

The Harmony Project was founded in Los Angeles in 2001 to provide free musical education to children in inner city neighborhoods. Several years ago Maestro Norman Nelson visited the Harmony Project in L.A. and came away inspired to bring a similar program to Sooke.

Although the context in inner city L.A. of violent gangs and extreme poverty is quite different from our context here in tranquil and relatively well-off Sooke, both communities share the need for more access to musical education.

Harmony Project Sooke has accomplished much in the less than a year since its establishment. It currently runs a Beginning Strings Class for grades 2-4 students and a Drumline Class for grades 6 and up. The children and youth attend classes 2-3 times a week outside of school time.

The evening will begin with a screening of the recently produced half hour documentary **"For the Love of Music"**, described as *"an intimate look at the celebrated Sooke Philharmonic Orchestra...and its relevance within this small West Coast town"*.

This will be followed by several shorter films about the founding of HP in L.A., including some captivating testimonials by graduates and fascinating research on the benefits of learning to play a musical instrument.

After the screenings moviegoers are invited to enjoy live music by members of the Sooke Philharmonic Orchestra and Harmony Project Sooke and a concession offering coffee, mulled cider, baked goodies and popcorn all in the theatre foyer.

Donations from the door and the concessions will go toward the work of HPS and SPOSociety to continue promoting and producing music in our community.

7. OTTER POINT FIRE DEPARTMENT AGM REPORT

The Otter Point Fire Protection and Emergency Response Service Commission held its Annual General Meeting on Wednesday, November 9th. Re-elected for another two-year term were commissioners Kenny Jones (Chair), Bud Gibbons (Treasurer) and Joanne Hemphill. Commissioners with another year remaining in their two-year term are: Marie-Ann Davidson (Secretary), Lloyd Heinemann and Harold Melville. Scott Hemphill remains as the firefighters' representative on the commission. The Juan de Fuca Electoral Area (JDFEA) Regional Director sits as an ex officio member of the commission but does not attend meetings unless there is a specific agenda item requiring his participation.

The commission was established by the Capital Regional District (CRD) in 1980, and is the successor to the Otter Fire District Society. The commissioners are responsible to the CRD Board of Directors and the taxpayers of Otter Point for the general operation of the Otter Point Fire Department (OPFD), and they appoint the Fire Chief who manages the day-to-day operations of the department.

The volunteer fire department responds to a range of fire and other emergencies in the community including:

- Structural, chimney, appliance, brush, beach and open burning fires
- Motor vehicles accidents, where fire or trapped occupant(s) is a concern
- Hazardous material spills
- Alarm bells
- First Response for medical assistance
- Open burning complaints
- Down Hydro lines where fire or public safety is a concern
- Mutual aid to other local area fire departments (**see note**).

Note: Mutual aid arrangements with neighbouring fire departments have increased callouts. The OPFD responded to 22 Mutual Aid requests this past year – mostly from the District of Sooke, and received assistance from other fire departments 4 times

The Otter Point Volunteer Fire Fighters Association (OPVFFA) operates the Fire Training Centre located behind the Otter Point Fire Hall. In addition to providing live fire training for the OPFD, this facility provides regional training sessions in conjunction with the BC Justice Institute and is rented to other volunteer fire departments. These fire departments rent the facility for approximately \$1,000 a day depending on activities. The revenue is used to offset the costs of operating and maintaining the training centre. This arrangement allows the fire department to enjoy considerable savings in training costs as it enables the OPFD to use the facility year-round and saves the cost of sending Otter Point firefighters away to another facility. Grants from the BC Lotteries Commission help to offset the centre's costs.

The OPFD is supported by taxpayers who own property within the Otter Point Fire Protection District boundary. Some owners of undeveloped land in Otter Point choose not to pay for fire protection, and are therefore not covered by the OPFD. The commissioners prepare an annual operating budget which is approved by the JDFEA Regional Director and the Finance Department of the CRD. The budget for the department's operation in 2016 was \$375,750. The budget for 2017 is \$387,300 - a 3.1% increase over 2016. The estimated cost per average Otter Point household in 2016 was about \$324 and for 2017 will be about \$334. The cost to individual property owners in Otter Point for fire protection and emergency response services appears as a line item on your provincial tax assessment; for 2016 it is \$92.94 per \$100,000 of assessed property value.

The 2016 OPFD annual report notes a 12% decrease in the volume of call-outs, with a year-to-year drop from 174 to 153. The most notable statistic was the decrease in **First Response** calls, which went from 69 in 2015 to 52 so far in 2016. Although the number of First Response calls dropped for the first time in 5 years, they remain high, and account for 34% of the fire department's total requests for service. First Response incidents are generated by 911 calls to the BC Ambulance Service who then request that the fire department also attend.

Note 1: The category **Fire** includes: brush/grass; hydro; open burning; appliance; chimney; structural (commercial, residential and mobile home/trailer) and vehicle fires as well as smelling smoke.

Note 2: Hydro calls are when a line is down and the OPFD responds to provide public safety until a Hydro crew arrives.

The volunteer firefighter man-hours for all incidents this past year totaled 767; a 32% decrease over 2015 – a reflection of the decrease in call-outs. In addition to these hours, the volunteers logged another 1,890 man-hours of training. In total, this equates to an average of 166 hours per member - the equivalent of 4.1 forty-hour work weeks.
